Friends -

It's been another challenging year. We've all continued to deal with the impact of the pandemic, an uncertain budgetary environment, and a new Mayoral administration. And despite this, we've once again emerged as a strong, unified collective. This year has reaffirmed the power and resilience of the human services sector, and we look forward to what's in store for HSC in the years ahead.

In FY22, we advocated for our sector in new and meaningful ways – and with promising results.

The recommendations from our Human Services Recovery Taskforce report, Essential or Expendable: How Human Services Supported Communities Through COVID-19 and Recommendations to Support an Equitable Recovery, have continued to gain momentum among State and City legislators. Because of our efforts, many leaders are on board with our vision for the sector.

Together, we launched the JustPay campaign to end government-sanctioned poverty wages for human services workers, which has already secured \$560 million for our human services workforce. Thanks to the thousands of human services workers who built this movement, we won a \$60 million human services workforce investment in the FY23 City budget and \$500 million (5.4%) cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) in the FY23 State budget - the first COLA that State-contracted human services workers have received in over a decade.

We built on last year's victory in restoring the Indirect Cost Rate Initiative by securing FY22 baselined funding - allowing you to do the work the community needs with sufficient funds. We're also representing the needs of the sector in our legal action against the implementation of Local Law 87 to ensure it does not impact your work.

As always, we've served as a key informational hub and created space for nonprofit leaders to share concerns, expertise, and questions to address challenges facing their organizations.

We have a lot to celebrate. As you read through these pages, I hope you're proud of the incredible community we have built together. You are the reason we do this work, and your creativity, perseverance, and dedication to New York makes our work filled with joy.

PROMOTING POLICIES TO STRENGTHEN THE SECTOR

Essential or Expendable?

How Human Services Supported Communities Through COVID-19 and Recommendations to Support an Equitable Recovery



HUMAN SERVICES RECOVERY TASKFORCE REPORT

In FY22, our policy work focused on promoting and advocating for HSC's recommendations to strengthen the resilience of New York's human services sector as we start to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic. The framework for our advocacy was our 2021 report published by HSC's Human Services Recovery Taskforce. The report established a powerful narrative about the role of the human services sector in New York's recovery from the pandemic and provided recommendations for reform.

With the report's recommendations as our core policy goals, we advocated for policies to transform New York's human services sector and ensure City and State-contracted human services workers are paid equitable wages.



Taskforce Report Recommendations

- Human services nonprofits must be a part of crisis response and community recovery.
- Government must commit to paying equitable wages to contracted human services workers.
- Government must pay in full and on time for essential services for New Yorkers. Human services contracts must cover indirect expenses, reflect market rates for goods and services, and end delayed reimbursements that amount to millions of dollars.
- Transform the human services procurement system to prioritize meaningful outcomes for New Yorkers, rather than race-tothe-bottom cost-cutting, starting with a Procurement Reform Commission.

BUILDING SUPPORT WITH STAKEHOLDERS

Throughout FY22, we shared our Taskforce report recommendations with key stakeholders from across the human services sector, government, philanthropy and business. The report and its recommendations were well-received by the sector and government leaders, including the new Mayoral administration.



CITY GOVERNMENT



Mayoral Transition

We published our taskforce report in time for the November 2021 citywide elections, creating an opportunity to share our vision with candidates and present newly elected leaders with a path forward. Prior to the November 2021 citywide elections, HSC held forums for the Mayoral and Comptroller candidates, sharing our recommendations with candidates and continuing to engage them through their transition teams following the election.



In June 2022, HSC and UJA-Federation of New York co-hosted a reception welcoming members of Mayor Eric Adams' Administration. Our close partners, Deputy Mayor for Health and Human Services Anne Williams-Isom and Deputy Mayor for Strategic Initiatives Sheena Wright, shared their vision for working with HSC members to build a more equitable human services sector.


City Council Transition

We also shared our report and recommendations with the new class of City Councilmembers from the 2021 elections, several of whom have backgrounds in nonprofits and serve as Chairs of committees that impact the human services sector. We continue to form relationships with the various caucuses within the City Council to build support for our advocacy efforts.

Joint Taskforce to Get Nonprofits Paid on Time

Demonstrating the salience of HSC's procurement work, HSC's Executive Director, Michelle Jackson, was asked to participate on Mayor Adams and Comptroller Lander's Joint Task Force to Get Nonprofits Paid on Time, which was formed based on one of HSC's Task Force recommendations.

The Joint Task Force has published policy reforms to change the City's procurement process in its February 2022 memo A Better Contract for New York. The Task Force's work helped unlock almost \$5 billion in contract dollars through the "Clear the Backlog" Initiative.





STATE GOVERNMENT



HSC shared our taskforce report and recommendations with Governor Kathy Hochul, Director of State Operations of New York Kathryn Garcia, as well as the State Assembly and State Senate. We also met with Governor Hochul's team to garner support for HSC's JustPay campaign, launched as an offshot of the Taskforce report.



OTHER STAKEHOLDERS

HSC's taskforce recommendatios were also included in a March 2022 report with James Parrott of the New School's Center for NYC Affairs, The Case for Ending Poverty Wages for NYC's Human Services Workers.

THE JUSTPAY CAMPAIGN

Current New York City and State contracts have resulted in the essential human services workforce being some of the lowest paid workers in New York's economy. In October 2021, based on a recommendation from our Taskforce report, HSC launched the JustPay campaign to end government-sanctioned poverty wages for human services workers.

By centering the voices of workers and empowering them to share their stories, we are fighting to ensure that the City and State provide them with the wages, benefits, and opportunities they need to thrive while serving our communities.

WE ARE FIGHTING TO:

- Establish, fund, and enforce an automatic annual cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) on all human services contracts.
- Set a living wage floor of no less than \$21 an hour for all City and State funded human services workers.
- Create, fund, and incorporate a comprehensive wage and benefit schedule for governmentcontracted human services workers comparable to the salaries made by City and State employees in the same field.




























WHY JUSTPAY?

The government is the main driver of human services salaries. Current City and State contracts have resulted in the human services workforce in being the fifth lowest paid workforce in New York's economy, despite the crucial role they play in strengthening our communities.



About two-thirds of all full-time human services workers had 2019 earnings below the City's near-poverty threshold.

Human services workers make about 71% of what government employees make for the same role.




Human services worker salaries



One in five human services workers received SNAP benefits from 2015-2019.

15% of human services workers qualify for food stamps, higher than the 12% share for all private sector workers and 9% of government employees.

BUILDING GRASSROOTS POWER



The progress that JustPay made in its first year was possible because of grassroots support from human services workers who shared their stories at our rallies, made calls, and sent letters. HSC will continue to elevate their experiences and bring their voices to City Hall and Albany.

ORGANIZING ACADEMY



One way HSC is continuing to build grassroots power for JustPay is through the Organizing Academy, a series of workshops that equip human services workers at our member organizations with key advocacy tools.

We launched our first Organizing Academy in Summer 2021 and offered it again in Summer 2022.

Other Advocacy Efforts

In addition to our JustPay successes, we also secured victories for the sector in other areas:



INDIRECT COST RATE INITIATIVE



Over the past few years, HSC has pushed City officials to include financial support for nonprofit indirect costs in human services contracts. Contracts have not funded these costs, meaning NYC organizations were forced to struggle to find alternative dollars to keep City-funded programs running. Because of HSC's advocacy, the City restored the Indirect Cost Rate initiative and baselined funding for FY22, allowing human services organizations to do the work they need to do to support their communities.



LEGAL ACTION AGAINST LOCAL LAW 87



HSC has worked to represent human services organizations to the City as it implements Local Law 87 (Labor Peace Agreement), which impacts the registration of human services contracts and was passed without input from the human services sector. HSC has pursued legal action on this issue and will continue to represent the interests of human services organizations as this moves forward.

CREATING A MORE RESILIENT HUMAN SERVICES SECTOR





PREPARING THE SECTOR FOR EMERGENCIES AND DISASTERS

HSC strengthened our Disaster Preparedness and Response Program to equip human services organizations with the knowledge and tools necessary to effectively prepare for, react to, and emerge from disasters so that they may continue to serve their communities during times of crisis.

EMERGENCY PLAN TEMPLATE AND TOOLKIT

HSC gathered feedback from member organizations to update our Emergency Plan Template and Toolkit, which we made publicly available to help organizations create an effective emergency plan. With these recommendations implemented into our new template, New York City can look forward to meeting crises with the support of a strong, resilient, and ready human services sector.




DISASTER PREPAREDNESS TRAININGS


Fiscal Year 2022
